# Community Considers Plans for Knowledge Park Winthrop's Office of Sustainability encourages students' voice in local meeting

Community members will discuss the potential of a new transportation system for a connected business and educational park between Winthrop University and downtown Rock Hill on Thursday, Oct. 22, at 5:30 p.m. in the community room of the new Family Trust Federal Credit Union, at 225 West White Street. If approved, the park would have a significant effect on the transportation options available to Winthrop students and faculty/staff. Winthrop University's Office of Sustainability encourages students to attend this open meeting and voice their concerns.

The Office of Sustainability is concerned with the current modes of transportation available to Rock Hill and the harmful environmental pollution caused by cars. A recent survey performed by the Office of Sustainability showed that 77% of the students surveyed stated they drive to campus. Through various programming, Chris Johnson, Sustainability Coordinator of the Office of Sustainability, works to promote alternative modes of transportation such as walking, biking, and carpooling. The development of Knowledge Park would provide students more sustainable and convenient means of travel. The proposed route for the new transportation system would run down Oakland Avenue.

Knowledge Park would span from Winthrop's campus to Rock Hill's Fountain Park. The proposed one-square mile, urban and mixed-use area is designed to foster a strong and unified economic center. Four modes of transportation are being considered for Knowledge Park: rubber-tired trolleys, bus system, streetcars, and an esplanade (pedestrian mall).

"A trolley could be at least a short-term solution to Rock Hill's current lack of available public transportation," says Chris Johnson. Each of these options could promote growth and sustainability in the local economy by providing locals, students and tourists alternative modes of transportation connecting the educational and business hubs of Rock Hill.

The development of Knowledge Park is an opportunity for the university to get involved in an environmentally sustainable program affecting both the campus and the community. Any of the four possible transportation systems could lead to less car traffic in Rock Hill.
